Stop the presses. Sadly, the Fieldstone Press, which has donated printing costs to the Royalston Community Newsletter for over seven years, is closing due to serious health concerns of the director, Jon Hardie. The money that has been saved in printing costs has been applied to the "Out of the Box Fund" and has enabled to Friends of the Library to purchase needed computers, printers, routers and software. It has helped the library provide "high speed" internet service to the community, making the internet free and accessible to all, including families, seniors, students, job seekers and the many frustrated residents still dealing with dial up service. The cost of the donated printing over seven years has totaled more than \$29,000. Library staff and the Friends group are very grateful for Fieldstone Press' owners, Jon Hardie and Becky Kraus-Hardie's, dedication to improving access to information both through print and electronic media in our sleepy town. These two citizens have subtly but substantially improved the quality of life of many. Thanks so much to the team at Fieldstone.

Broadband Update: The best chance for Royalston to be included in the state program for state-wide broadband is for us to complete the internet access survey to show that high speed internet access is not available for most of Royalston. This is the survey included in the tax bills. It is also available online at www.mass-broadband.org/mapping/survey.html, at the library, Selectmen's office, or Royalston Country Store. Completed paper surveys are being collected at the town locations as well. The survey takes about 2 minutes to complete. If you have not already done so, please complete the survey to help everyone in Royalston. The next Broadband meeting will be Thursday, October 12 at 7:00 pm in the Town Hall.

Sewer Treatment plant replacement: This summer, the Board of Selectmen submitted a federal grant proposal to replace the aging sewer treatment plant in town. The grant is currently at the review stage and is being scrutinized. The grant would provide up to 75% of the cost of a new system. Selectmen and other town offices are responding to requests for additional information. We hope that we will hear a favorable answer soon.

There are still some folks who have not purchased their new transfer station sticker. These were due July 1st. They are \$15 for residents and \$5 for 2nd vehicles.

There are some that say that they only recycle and do not bring trash so why do they need a sticker. The annual sticker does several things. It helps us determine who is a resident and who is not; nonresidents have a higher sticker price of \$50. The revenue helps offset the cost of recycling that we do not charge for. The bottles and cans bin has a transportation cost. The reusable area has cost when we have to regularly throw things out. Occasionally, someone leaves us presents which costs us. The goal of the transfer station has always to break even. Those that continually argue and try to get away without getting a sticker are actually cheating on all of us. Be a good neighbor and citizen and get your sticker!

Also, the staff does not enjoy asking where your sticker is. Place the sticker on the driver's side lower windshield. For those of you who have ID issues, place the sticker on the driver's side dashboard so that the attendant can see it.

There's still plastic packaging thrown in with cardboard boxes in the paper. Happy 200th Birthday to The Maples

More than 150 people assembled recently at Patience and Werner Bundschuh's house on the Common to celebrate the 200th birthday of "The Maples", the name given to their home by the Hill Family, who owned the house for three generations from the 1890's to the 1960's. More than a half dozen Hill family members, from across the country, came to share in the celebration.

Rufus Bullock built the Federal style mansion in 1810 and his son Alexander Hamilton Bullock, who became Governor of Massachusetts, was born there. The Bundschuhs moved into the Maples in 1979 and are only the third family to occupy the house.

Marty Picard's 17-piece Reminisce Orchestra played dance favorites from the 1920s and 30s while Royalston's own Teddy Bear manned the pig roast.

Recipe of the Month: Snack Like a Starlett

One of the joys of cooler weather to cozy up, turn on the oven and bake something aromatic and hedonistic. Long time library trustee, Polly Longsworth, submitted just the ticket, her secret brownie recipe. She confesses, "Its source is rumored to be Katharine Hepburn, via a long ago Ladies Home Journal issue. Chuck eats no other variety, not just because it was his mother's recipe, but 'cuz the brownies are truly super. He's given me permission to share it."

Hepburn Brownies

Oil brownie pan; preset oven to 325 degrees

2 sq. unsweetened chocolate 1/4 lb. butter (1 stick)
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/4 cup flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup chopped walnuts

Melt chocolate and butter together over low heat. Meanwhile, beat eggs well and slowly add sugar, then beat in vanilla. Stir together flour and salt and add to egg\sugar mix. Add melted chocolate & butter. Add chopped walnuts. Pour mixture into pan. Bake just 1/2 hour @ 325 degrees - they may seem underdone, but will become ideally chewy as they cool. Cut while warm.

Garden Notes

September 22, 2010

The weather has been nothing but persistent. Two inches of rain since I last wrote has provided little relief to the garden or the groundwater level (has anyone noticed what remains of the Miller's River in South Royalston?). Yes, there has been some moderation in temperatures but not before another blast of hot weather at the beginning of the month. Whatever thoughts the cucumbers and squash had of recovering from the August heat were dispelled. Remarkably, the plants continue to flower and set fruit, in spite of the fact that they are virtually leaf-free. The remainder of the garden trucks on, an island of green within a sea of brown grass. I continue to water, at least the most recent plantings of spinach and beets and they have been responding to the attention. Royalston seems to have been a pepper-free zone this summer. Everyone I ask mentions luxurious growth with few fruit. The best explanation I've heard is that the plants were unable to flower during June's intense heat. Wouldn't you know, my plants have finally flowered and I'm already formulating plans for some elaborate structure to protect them from a frost or two. Peppers at the end of October? Wouldn't that be something? (It's all in the challenge; I don't particularly like peppers.)

Finally, a tale of two harvests. First, the winter squash. I have been known to crawl down the rows of my winter squash, looking under the canopy of leaves in my zeal to determine how many fruits are developing. That canopy was one of the first casualties of summer's torrid conditions. The plants remained alive, though, and I figured the squash would hold up better on the vine than in the house. I thought wrong. One day, I glanced a the patch and discovered every buttercup squash had succumbed to sunscald (the butternuts had not). Sunscald is just what you might imagine, large spots bleached white by the sun. I have seen it on tomatoes and peppers but never on squash. The fruit will rot and split at the point of the scald. We have embarked upon a buttercup squash feeding frenzy.



Second, the grapes. As grape gleaners among you know, wild grape vines abound but wild grapes do not. I saw none until Barbara and Enis Willhite called to invite me to pick from a couple of vines abutting their pond (dry, I might add, for the first time ever). The grapes were delightful, in aroma as well as flavor. We have our own arbor where six vines were set out thirty or so years ago. It has collapsed into a pile of posts, boards, and wires, over-

run with the vines. Since we can count our total harvests on one hand (and have several fingers left over), I've been less than enthusiastic about restoring it to its former elegance. So, I'm leading the steer (well, the steer was leading me) to a more attractive feeding site when the telltale aroma hit me. I ended up with one and a half bushels of near-perfect Concord grapes.

So much for my finely-tuned, keen eye for detail.


